Congress's <u>rejection</u> of the <u>D.C. criminal code overhaul</u> comes on the heels of public discontent and valid concerns over violent <u>crime rates</u>, which are declining in most cities but remain well above 2019 levels. In doing so, city leaders still have a chance to satisfy congressional concerns and, most importantly, do more to reduce community violence and recidivism among people returning home from prison.

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
